



LENTEN SUNDAYS - FEBRUARY 26 - APRIL 2

Regular weekly worship at 8:15 and 10:30 AM worship in the sanctuary. This Lent, we will continue to move through the Revised Common Lectionary with our Sunday Scripture passages, moving us closer each week to Jesus' walk to the cross on our behalf. This year, our gospel readings all come from the Gospel of Matthew. If you wish to worship from your car in the church parking lot, we continue to broadcast it on 92.3 on your FM car radio dial. We will bring out a bulletin and Communion, as well as receive your offering. Also, A.C.E. and Sunday school are still in full swing on Sunday mornings from 9:30-10:15 am. A.C.E. can be found on our Livestream, as well.



LENTEN WEDNESDAYS, MARCH 1 - 29 "The Darkness is Not Dark to You"

This year's Lenten theme - "The Darkness is Not Dark to You" – comes from numerous places and themes in the Bible that specifically move us past thinking only about "darkness" or "night" as images of death, sin, evil, fear, or threat. Too often, we assign goodness and life to "light" versus badness and death to "dark." This is too simplistic and not Biblical. Psalm 139 is a particular focal point for us that promises a whole other dimension to darkness: the time of creative renewal with God. Each Wednesday during Lenten services,

we will explore this from different angles. How can darkness, nighttime, and quiet actually be time for God to envelope us in grace-filled rest, reflection, renewal, and relief? With God's assurance of love and safety for us during these times, how can times of darkness serve to draw us closer to God, produce honesty and repentance in us, help us lay back trustingly in God's arms of protection, and experience the weight of life lifted from us in the renewal of our minds and bodies? Finally, was it not in the darkness that Jesus gave up His life for us, slept in death in the tomb, and arose from it to walk into newness of life – God's gift of grace throughout every aspect of our journey through life and death and into resurrection?

We will worship at **6:30 pm in the sanctuary on Wednesdays** during Lent again this year. All Lenten services will also be LiveStreamed on YouTube, as well. Affirm Lenten Mentor Conversations

HOLY WEEK - PALM and PASSION SUNDAY, APRIL 2

8:15 and 10:30 am worship services, as usual, in the sanctuary. Again this year, we will experience a "procession of palms" from the back of the sanctuary to the front, mimicking what Jesus' followers did that first Palm Sunday in Jerusalem. While we read, pray, and sing, many of our own fellow Johnnies will join in procession waving palms and cheering in joy as they lay their palms at the foot of the cross in the front of the church and make way for Jesus to enter.

During the second half of the service, our focus transitions, as it did on the first Palm Sunday, from the cheers of Jesus as Messiah to Jesus' coming suffering and death on the cross. The St. John's Chancel Choir will share Faure's, "**Requiem**," this year's Lenten cantata. Be here for this important day! As we leave church this day, our attention will be turned to Maundy Thursday and the way Palm Sunday cheers turned to jeers as Jesus neared His betrayal and crucifixion. HOLY WEEK - MAUNDY THURSDAY, APRIL 6

We will gather in the sanctuary for **Maundy Thursday worship at 6:30 pm.** Our liturgy will help us experience Jesus' last supper with His disciples through traditional readings, hymns, and prayers. We will end with Holy Communion in the Upper Room, as we did last year, celebrating Jesus' liberation of us from our sins and from what and who oppresses us, followed by the Stripping of the Altar, indicating Jesus being stripped of his authority as he is betrayed into the hands of those who wish to put him to death. HOLY WEEK - GOOD FRIDAY, APRIL 7

Good Friday worship will take place in the sanctuary at 6:30 pm. This year's service will be a Tenebrae Service of Darkness, including a great deal of music through hymns and special music, as well as a remarkable reading of the Passion through an interactive readers' theater. In traditional fashion, we will close the service in silence with an invitation to kneel at the communion rail in your own time of personal confession before God.

EASTER SUNDAY - THE DAY OF RESURRECTION, APRIL 9

Jesus Christ is Risen Today! Easter Sunday festival services will take place at 8:15 and 10:30 am in the sanctuary. Holy Communion will be served at each service, with spectacular and inspiring special music. Find it online at www.sjlcl.org and click on "Online Services."

Ash Wednesday



Gathering

The assembly gathers in silence.

The service begins with Psalm 51 or another penitential psalm, a Kyrie or another litany, or a hymn. Or, the service begins simply with the greeting.

Greeting

The assembly stands. The presiding minister and the assembly greet each other. The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Prayer of the Day

Response after the prayer: **Amen**. The assembly is seated.

Word

Readings and Psalm

An assisting minister reads the first and second scripture readings. The psalm for the day follows the first reading. The psalm is Psalm 51, or Psalm 103:8-14 if Psalm 51 is sung at the gathering or during the imposition of ashes.

Response after the conclusion of the first and the second readings: **Thanks be to God**.



ASH WEDNESDAY

Gospel Acclamation

The assembly stands. The following or another appropriate acclamation may be sung. Return to the LORD, your God, who is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love.

Gospel

Response after the announcement: Glory to you, O Lord. Response after the conclusion: Praise to you, O Christ.

The assembly is seated.

Sermon

Silence for reflection follows.

Hymn of the Day

The assembly stands to proclaim the word of God in song.

Invitation to Lent

The assembly is seated. The presiding minister may invite the assembly into the discipline of Lent.

Confession of Sin

The presiding minister leads the following or another confession. Let us confess our sin in the presence of God and of one another.

The assembly kneels or sits. Silence is kept for reflection and self-examination.

Most holy and merciful God,
we confess to you and to one another,
and before the whole company of heaven,
that we have sinned by our fault,
by our own fault,
by our own most grievous fault,
in thought, word, and deed,
by what we have done and by what we have left undone.

We have not loved you with our whole heart, and mind, and strength. We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We have not forgiven others as we have been forgiven.

Have mercy on us, O God.

We have shut our ears to your call to serve as Christ served us. We have not been true to the mind of Christ. We have grieved your Holy Spirit. Have mercy on us, O God.

Our past unfaithfulness, the pride, envy, hypocrisy, and apathy that have infected our lives, we confess to you.

Have mercy on us, O God.

Our self-indulgent appetites and ways, and our exploitation of other people, we confess to you.

Have mercy on us, O God.

Our negligence in prayer and worship, and our failure to share the faith that is in us, we confess to you.

Have mercy on us, O God.

Our neglect of human need and suffering, and our indifference to injustice and cruelty, we confess to you.

Have mercy on us, O God.

Our false judgments, our uncharitable thoughts toward our neighbors, and our prejudice and contempt toward those who differ from us, we confess to you. Have mercy on us, O God.

Our waste and pollution of your creation, and our lack of concern for those who come after us, we confess to you.

Have mercy on us, O God.

Restore us, O God, and let your anger depart from us.

Hear us, O God, for your mercy is great.



Imposition of Ashes

People may come forward and kneel or stand to receive the ashes.

Ministers mark the forehead of each person with a cross of ashes, saying:
Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return.
During this time, hymns or penitential psalms may be sung, or silence may be kept. Psalm 51 may be sung if it has not been used earlier in the service.

After those who desire ashes have received them, all may kneel or sit, and the minister continues. Accomplish in us, O God, the work of your salvation, that we may show forth your glory in the world.

By the cross and passion of your Son, our Savior, bring us with all your saints to the joy of his resurrection.

The presiding minister addresses the assembly.

Almighty God have mercy on us, forgive us all our sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen us in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep us in eternal life.

Amen.

A service with communion continues with the prayers of intercession. The prayer, blessing, and dismissal below may be used after the communion.

OR

A service without communion concludes as follows.

Prayers of intercession may be spoken.

An offering may be gathered for the mission of the church, including the care of those in need. "Create in me" (#185–188) may be sung after the offering is gathered.

The service ends with the following prayer, the Lord's Prayer, and the sending.

The assisting minister leads a concluding prayer.

Merciful God, accompany our journey through these forty days. Renew us in the gift of baptism, that we may provide for those who are poor, pray for those in need, fast from self-indulgence, and above all that we may find our treasure in the life of your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

Amen.

The Lord's Prayer is prayed by all.

Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come,
your will be done,
on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins
as we forgive those
who sin against us.
Save us from the time of trial
and deliver us from evil.

The assisting minister may address the assembly.


