2023 Annual Report Rev. Eric Lesher, Interim Pastor

In the book of Titus, Paul remarks, "¹⁴He (Jesus) gave his life to free us from every kind of sin, to cleanse us, and to make us his very own people, totally committed to doing good deeds."

It is has been a joy during my interim to watch this verse come to fruition among you. Your deeds as God's people bring goodness into a world in need of good news. From Sunday morning, to Wednesday evening and through all the small groups and volunteers who gather on behalf of St. John's, God's goodness continues to thrive here. It is good to see.

The laugher and conversation that energizes our community whenever we gather is encouraging and contagious. You would be surprised on how much energy for ministry is created within a community that is not afraid to share and to laugh. Loving Service: Following Jesus' model for us, our calling is to serve and not be served, and give our lives to set others free from whatever may weigh them down.

Gracious Hospitality: Jesus created space for those on the margins, accepting them as they are, and gave them space to be made new. As his body in this world, we offer this same gracious hospitality to all who walk with us.

Inspiring Worship: Jesus taught that we worship in spirit and truth. Worship comforts, challenges and changes us. We recognize that all of us are comforted, challenged and changed in a different ways when it comes to worship.

Compassionate Justice: Old Testament prophets reminds us that God demands compassion over holiness, as we remember that all of us are made in God's image and therefore all of us have equal access to the abundant life that God offers to all of us. So we strive to follow the words of the prophet Hosea, "Do justice, love compassion, walk humbly with your God."

Joyful Generosity: We seek to look at our world through eyes of abundance and desire to give as we have received. God's abundance includes our time, talent and treasure. In joy we give out of the abundance we have received.

We will need to prioritize expanding this sustainability trend in the years ahead, but we give thanks that good growth is taking roots!

As we ponder this question of legacy at year's end, I ask you to return to your center: Why is St. John's your church home? How does St. John's nurture your faith and challenge you serve others? Finally, as we begin 2024, how will you commit (or recommit) yourself to investing in St. John's legacy for others of every generation?

Thank you for all of the ways that you contribute to making St. John's the wonderful faith community that we are! Your presence matters, your faith matters, your serving matters. May God bless and keep us in all that is to come.

DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

2023 has been a year of arrival in the St. John's music program. The JAM (elementary) Choir has grown both in size and confidence, singing with divided parts for the first time in December as they brought their infectious joy to the 8:15 service, also for the first time. In its October Wed. night appearance, the Middle School Choir demonstrated its leadership training as it featured several soloists. The Sunday School children sang in six services including Palm/Passion Sunday, Reformation, and their Christmas program, *Christmas in a Box* on Advent III.

The Wednesday night service is developing its own personality, now with guitarists as well as piano and cantors. An initiative to include songs that reflect St. John's commitment to God's work of service, justice and peace is underway, with suggestions being solicited.

Congregation soloists have included vocalists, flute, marimba, oboe, and a euphonium solo that was postponed to 2024 due to illness. Dr. Luke Randall, baritone, was a guest soloist in August this year, sponsored by a member. Hymn sings in July and December, and a jazz service in August also brought some variety to Sunday worship. At a time when many congregations are struggling to find competent worship accompaniment, St. John's enjoys two capable and sensitive organists, Priscilla Thoreen, and Dr. Karen Olson. Expanding the range of musical offerings, on Palm/Passion Sunday we presented the Gabriel Fauré setting of the *Requiem* in Latin with printed and projected translation. A professional orchestra and organ sup-

ported the Chancel Choir, one hired soprano chorister, and two St. John's vocal soloists. On Easter, we featured a flutist, brass quartet, and percussion trio of congregation members leading with the Chancel Choir. Reformation Sunday also included St. John's brass players and flute. Advent I services featured the Buxtehude cantata *In dulci jubilo – Good Christian Friends Rejoice* as the anchor for a diverse Chancel Choir program with professional string quartet, organ, piano, and several vocal soloists.

The Interim Director of Music, Roxanne Litchfield, comes with more than 30 years of church parish music leadership, most recently at St. John's ELCA in Eau Claire. Since her first church choir directing experience at age 12, she has led adult choirs, children's choirs, handbell and other instrumental groups in several Lutheran churches. She was alto section leader as a founding member of the National Lutheran Choir. A professional vocalist for many years, she is also a beloved piano teacher, and plays piano and organ for worship. Roxanne has already been on the St. John's payroll, mentoring us in children's music programming and leadership. She brings an infectious positivity and deep devotion to nurturing the congregation's song to her interim ministry.

St. John's Worship Arts Ministry team was busy in 2023, with sanctuary preparation and outdoor tree-lighting creating a warm welcome for worshipers and the community. WAM took over the ordering and care for poinsettias and Easter flowers as part of our responsibility for the atmosphere and look of our worship space, and as a modest fundraiser for special events. A recommendation to celebrate communion weekly was researched and reviewed (thanks to Dan Nelson and Pastor Eric), presented to Council, practiced in November, and will be evaluated for implementation in the new year. A continuing priority for WAM into 2024 is securing funding for the live-stream upgrade. Responding to financial concerns, we cut back offerings requiring guest performers in 2023. Music and WAM left nearly \$5,000 of their \$15,000 budget unspent. We deeply appreciate Pam Haukoos' exemplary service as Chair and Council liaison, as she rotates out in January.

DIRECTOR OF CHILDREN, YOUTH, AND FAMILY MINISTRIES

St. John's Lutheran Church has so many moments in ministry in 2023 to be thankful for! We are appreciative and have humble gratitude for God's guidance as we continue the work of teaching our children the love and hope of Jesus. My favorite verse to teach our High School Youth is Philippians 4:13, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." Then I say, though that doesn't mean you should actually do all of the things, just find the places that God is leading you, then do those things. Listen with your heart where God is leading you. It has been a good year to ask many good questions and listen with our whole hearts to each other and to listen to what God wants for us. Listening in the quiet moments and in the loud and busy ones too! Where has God led us this year? Many places near and far.

A summary of our primary programs for 2023.

The Children Youth and Family team's primary purpose is to create a ministry that walks alongside families to raise students with a heart for Jesus and faith filled love. Amanda Boe Children Youth and Family Director, along with our VBS Coordinator Elisa Brown, Children's Music Director, Malynda Davis and an awesome volunteer staff of teachers try to combine our unique gifts of ministry to come together to accomplish that goal. Pastor Kim Kyllo advises on Children, Youth and Family programs as well as leads our Affirm program.

Sunday School Ministry

Our Sunday School program began this year with a fun Rally Day event with carnival games outside and a service fair. We have 82 students registered for fall of 2023 Sunday School programs. After receiving input from families regarding a Wednesday night program our Children, Youth and Family team decided to try a

Wednesday Highlights Sunday School option.

On Wednesdays, we "highlight" the lesson that was taught the previous Sunday and have a shorter version of the lesson. We have Affirm Students lead small groups in Bible stories and games. We have averaged 20 students each Wednesday and have received positive feedback from families. This has been a fun adventure and I am looking forward to continuing to provide a Wednesday option that complements and supports our Sunday School program.

On Sundays, we meet in a large group where the students hear the Bible Theme, learn a new song or get a special visit from Abel & Zabel, our puppet friends. After a large group, they have 30 minutes of class time in small grade specific groups. On Sundays, we continue to have great attendance in our classes and often see students attend both Wednesdays and Sunday classes.

We are thankful for our Sunday School teachers, leaders and assistants that lend their many gifts to create a wonderful faith-filled experience for our students each week.

Children's Music Ministry

Report by Malynda Riehle, Children's Music Director

The JAM (Jesus and Me) Choir had 13 members and sang once a month on Sunday mornings.

We attempted to sing at 8:30am service one time and the families informed me that that was not something easy for them to do, so we made the decision to sing only at the 10:30am services to keep our member numbers up.

The middle school choir (name is still to be determined, as I want the youth to own their choir and choose a name they love) had 8 members. The middle school choir sang during Wednesday Night services. I recognize that many of the middle school choir members have sports and other activities that make it very difficult to get to church on Sunday mornings. Deciding to sing on Wednesday evenings was what fit their life.

Our Sunday School music ministry begins every Sunday with song and dance. Once a month we sing during church. I choose songs for them that not only give them a lesson in God's love and being children of God, but that also leave something in their hearts. Growing up, there were a handful of songs that I learned in Sunday School, that I could lean on when I felt sad, or down, that would make me feel better, and this is what I want for the children. In December, we have our Christmas Program. Looking ahead to the Christmas Program for 2024, I have decided to write a program for the children.

Preteen and Youth Ministry

Ablaze a confirmation prep, 5th grade ministry

Ablaze, our confirmation prep program strives to prepare our students for their confirmation program, Affirm. Our fifth-grade Ablaze group uses the Action Bible to read through the sequence of the Bible from Old Testament to New Testament. In spring of 2023, our class of 23 celebrated their First Holy Communion. We had three special classes that family members attended to prepare for this faith milestone. We made clay communion cups with the help of Rollie and Phil Brandt and we made bread for the congregation to use for Palm Sunday Communion.

Affirm, Confirmation Ministry

All are welcome to a place where we encourage, lead and accompany youth to claim their faith.

Affirm operates on a four-year model in which 6-9th graders are all divided up into grade-level small groups, accompanied by an adult leader(s), as they grow in faith, learn more about the Bible and how to read it with curiosity and confidence, ask deep questions, serve God and our neighbors, and claim faith for themselves. After their first three years of Affirm in 6-8th grade, 9th graders grow into a capstone year called Affirm Plus, which concentrates on building leadership skills in faith, including a growing awareness of their unique

spiritual gifts and an ability to articulate what faith means to them, through reflection, creativity, and prayer.

Our Affirm program continues to grow and we are thankful for the leadership of Pastor Kim Kyllo and the many volunteer staff that assist with the program. In the fall of 2023, we had 83, 6th-9th grade students and many volunteer leaders that led our 11 small groups for the Affirm program. This fall, we began in outdoor classrooms centered around a bonfire, reading the Bible and focusing on building relationships with our small group members. Fellowship activities and service projects continue to be important and valued pieces of our program. Blanket making, Christmas party and caroling to local senior centers have been wonderful experiences to build community and strengthen relationships.

HS Youth Group

Our High School Youth Group continues to show strong leadership at church and continues to plan for various community service events and are important faith mentors to our younger students. In 2023 this group learned a lot during the planning for the mission trip to Bayou LaBatre in Alabama. They are currently planning a mission trip to Duluth through Service-Learning Camps. They meet each week from 8:00pm-8:30pm with interim Pastor Eric Lesher for the High School Youth Group. The attendance continues to grow and their excitement for growing and strengthening their faith is inspiring.

Special Events

Rally Sunday, Trunk and Treat, Advent Festival, and our Christmas Program are just some of our special events we were able to enjoy this year. Our Children, Youth and Family team does a wonderful job planning and preparing for these events. Many have become successful outreach events that help us extend a special welcome to community members. The Trunk and Treat event had another year of more than 500 people in attendance. We are excited at the possibility of expanding these events in the future to continue to welcome people to our faith community.

Summer Stretch

Summer Stretch is a program for upper elementary and middle school students (students entering Grades 4,5, 6, 7 and 8 in Fall 2023) to put their faith in action and be the light of Christ. They participate in service projects for the greater community followed by afternoon adventures with friends. High School Students serve as group guides along with adult chaperones.

50 total youth were involved with this program. We averaged 32 participants each week.

Service Projects completed: Meals made for Feed My Starving Children, Befriending neighbors at Highview Hills and learning new board games, Arc Value Village- served in many ways-store clerks, sorted items and recycled donated items - helped them profit \$5,500.00 estimated in proceeds from sales. Made Blankets for Lewis House, organization that helps women and children in unsafe relationships. Majestic Horse Therapy Ranch, helping with yard work and maintenance, weeding flower beds at St. John's. Made Birthday Kits for 360 communities

Fun Destinations: Commemorative Air Force Museum, Windy Willow, Conquer Ninja Gyms, Sky Zone, Valley Fair.

Summer Garden Club

We started to plan for our 3rd year of Garden Club in January of 2023. We researched seed catalogs and had fun making plans for the upcoming summer. We are fortunate to have the help of Tab Pasvogel, a master gardener to advise the group. We also used Thrivent Action Team funds to help create our garden. Youth planted, weeded, fertilized, watered and harvested our garden. The best part was we donated our vegetables to low-income seniors in Lakeville! They loved receiving our tomatoes, cucumbers, beans, and squash.

Luther Crest Bible Camp

We had 43 St. John's youth attend Luther Crest Bible Camp two different weeks during the summer. Luther Crest Bible Campers spent the week at camp with many unique adventures and experiences! Many thanks to

the Luther Crest staff and our congregation for all of the support.

The journey to camp takes months of planning, preparation and fundraising. Fundraisers that helped to support our campers in 2023 were: Fall and Spring Butter Braid Sales, Lent Packaged Soup Sale, Palm Sunday Breakfast and Pancake Breakfast and a Compost Sale.

Our camp families have much gratitude for this congregation's continued support of Bible camp. Attending a Bible Camp or Mission Trip has the potential of being one of the most impactful experiences for young people's faith. We do encourage all of our Affirm students to attend a camp or mission trip at least once, this is why the continued support is so appreciated. We look forward to another year with a large group already signed up for camp in 2024!

Mission Trip to Bayou LaBatre Alabama

In June of 2023, we had 16 youth and 2 parent chaperones join me (Amanda) on this amazing adventure south. Youthworks is an organization based in Minnesota that has over 40 sites in the USA. Youthworks partners with local service agencies and community members to identify the needs of the community that can be best met by church groups that come each week through the summer.

Our Senior High School Students, Lisette and Lydia helped to make the final location decision. Their hope was to fully become immersed in a different culture and do meaningful and needed service work that shared the love and hope of Jesus. In October, we had our first meeting during Affirm to put our group together.

We connected with another organization, World Hopper Ministry to help get to our destination. We planned to fly and drive partly there.

When we arrived, we shared a meal together and had a full evening of training and learned that we would be serving the community in many ways: painting, yardwork, gardening, food shelf, child care, elder care and supporting community center activities. Our group of 16 was divided into two groups and on Monday morning we set out for our assignments.

Our plans got adjusted due to rain and our youth got to experience what hurricane type rain looked like! We got 3-5 inches that day and the storm caused a lot of damage to the community. During the rain, we worked indoors at Feeding the Gulf Coast and worked inside painting houses.

During each passing hour of our trip, our group became closer together as they served alongside one another. Each night we had devotions and a worship service led by our YouthWorks staff and two of the nights we were hosted by a Southern Baptist church for a meal and a Pentecostal Church. We also visited the shipyards where Forrest Gump was filmed and where the Black Pearl from Pirates of the Caribbean was built.

We are forever changed by our time in BLB. We could feel the love of Jesus at work through all those who we had the honor to humbly serve. All of our youth want to go on another mission trip as soon as possible. Our chaperones, Kristi Winkels and Alison Wohlhuter were absolutely amazing and worked so hard to support our youth!

Thank you so much for the congregation's support of our Youthworks Mission Trip to Bayou LaBatre, Alabama! Without your support this trip would not have been possible for our youth.

Vacation Bible School, submitted by Elisa Lande Brown

In VBS ministry our primary goal is to bring kids closer to their faith through a fun filled, multi-sensory

approach that includes music, games, crafts and visual experiences. 2023 marked my sixth year of providing VBS ministry at St. John's. We continued our upward trend in attendance at VBS with 94 campers this year, up from 85 last year! Like last year about half of our campers were from St. John's families and the other half were friends of St. John's families and Lakeville community members. Along with all our campers, we were blessed with a volunteer staff of over 43 adults, High School students and Middle School students, our highest number ever, contributing their time and talents to our VBS program!

Some highlights from VBS 2023 were:

- *Our theme was STELLAR, which included a lot of space facts and other things that the campers really enjoyed.
- *The kids enjoyed two daily slideshows, one at opening and one at closing, with songs, stories and videos all projected on the walls for everyone to see by the sanctuary projectors. The music of VBS is always a highlight of the program, so many fun songs to sing!!
- *We again had a service project time in one of our stations which the campers really liked.

These projects included:

- *Making birthday bags for kids who use our local food shelf.
- *Spreading Jesus' love with a butterfly craft that they then placed throughout the Community.
- *Making small flags with messages of Jesus' love for the pencils in the sanctuary
- *Our end of the week celebration, included fun Rocket Pops, in keeping with our space theme, for each camper and several glow in the dark activities to do at home.
- *Our generous St. John's community also provided wonderful donations of food and supplies throughout the week.

Global Missions has had a good year with members being able to connect with Muhanga through *What's App*. We both shared pictures and short videos of our services and children's programs.

In January, five U of MN engineering students visited Muhanga to determine a possible good water source. They presented their findings to the Bega Kwa Bega Water Project at the University which we were invited to attended and they also presented their findings at ACE in May.

In August Kisten Levorson, St Paul Synod coordinator for Bega Kwa Bega, and other ambassadors visited Muhanga on our behalf, reporting back how the village and parishes were doing. We also received an update on the construction of the dispensary. Kirsten also presented at ACE in November on the ambassador visit, and the impact Bega Kwa Bega has made on the lives of the people in Tanzania, especially women and girls.

Meeting monthly, the Ministry Finance Team also works to recommend financial strategies, options, and considerations to the Church Council and the congregation as a whole. The overarching goal of the Ministry Finance Team is to provide responsible stewardship of Church funds in a transparent manner, balancing the needs and desires of the Church with member contributions, as well as other revenue sources.

The Ministry Finance Team is also involved with building and recommending an annual budget to Church Council and the congregation for final approval. This process involves Church Staff and Ministry Teams performing careful review of their expected expenditures and revenues (where applicable) before submission to the MFT and the Financial Analyst, Tyra Wiemann. The MFT is tasked with aggregating all Teams' needs into a comprehensive annual budget.

The Ministry Finance Team complies a monthly Financial Performance Report for inclusion in the St. John's Journal. This report provides a monthly recap of revenues and expenditures, allowing congregational members the opportunity to have an ongoing clear understanding of the financial health of the Church.

Additionally, at least one member of the Ministry Finance Team works with other congregational volunteers to assist at each service with counting and recording offerings to ensure accuracy and proper allocation of funds received. The multi-person approach provides security, transparency, and a checks/balances

approach to offer congregational members and guests confidence that their generous offerings are allocated as desired.

The Education Team focuses its work primarily on Sunday morning Adult Christian Education (ACE). These sessions are a blend of spiritual formation and church ministry education. ACE meets regularly on Sunday mornings during the program year (September – May), and pauses during the summer months.

In 2023, ACE included a variety of sessions, including a three-part series on Faith and Mental Health, led by guest presenter Rev. Emmy Kegler. Pastor Amanda Simmons visited from Lutheran Social Services of Minnesota, to share about this ministry's current projects and ways for congregations like St. John's to get involved.

The Ministry Finance Team led a series of three sessions on ways to give financially, how to effectively make gifts to St. John's, and the upcoming formation of legacy giving with St. John's Foundation (new). Later, ACE explored the fall stewardship theme "Be Rich Toward God."

Professor Matt Anderson and his team of students visited from the University of Minnesota to share their exploratory visit to Muhanga, including the possibility of a sustainable water project. The year 2023 brought us again to in-person worship and events after the long disruption of the COVID-19 pandemic. What we did not do as a synod was to return to everything as it had been before. Recognizing that God always calls us forward into a new future, congregations discovered myriad ways to build on the lessons and new practices learned during the pandemic. Likewise, the synod embraced new ways of doing familiar things and experimented with new ideas and programs.

Here are some highlights of the investment of time and energy by the synod office during 2023. All these are made possible because of the generous financial support that passes from congregations to the synod. Thank you for helping us be a church together as we all find ways to be faithful to our callings in a changing and complex world.

An undeniable highlight was the presentation of a check for \$1,000,000 to Lutheran Social Service of Minnesota during Synod Assembly last May. The check is for renovations to a building that will house the Families Together East Side Preschool on the lower level of Grace Lutheran Church in St. Paul. This partnership is one of the pillars of The Planting Hope Campaign, which has raised \$1,473,861 to date at the end of December 2023. This is one half of our overall campaign goal.

In addition to this transformational work with LSS-MN, in 2023 we also launched the first summer of paid internships, funded through The Planting Hope Campaign. From June through August, nine young adults served in a variety of congregations and Lutheran agencies. We are grateful for the work of Pastor Bristol Reading (St. Luke, St. Paul) in overseeing this project. Also, we gave significant financial support to congregational vitality through the campaign. Those investments are detailed later in this report. Alongside the work of The Planting Hope Campaign, congregations like yours continue to contribute toward our budget of \$1,885,000 in mission support. Fiscal Year 2023 ends on January 31, 2024 and we hope to be at the goal by then. Again, thank you for seeing how your congregation's work is supported and expanded through our common funding of synod and ELCA churchwide ministries. Despite needing to navigate new realities in a post-pandemic world, God continues to crown our efforts with God's abundance. The synod's financial work is guided by David Roinas.

During 2023 there were 28 persons in the candidacy process, preparing to serve the wider church as pastors or deacons. Currently, 22 persons are serving their first call in the Saint Paul Area Synod. They also participate in a structured program of First Call Theological Education (FCTE). Both candidacy work and FCTE are led by Deacon Krista Lind. This past year two candidates received calls in other synods. As you might imagine, this work is important for the church today and for the church in the coming years.

Candidates ordained in 2023 include Pastor Jennifer Luong, Pastor Jua Jay Her, Pastor Carrie Stiles, Pastor Amy Vigesaa, Pastor Reed Fowler, Deacon Katherine Lindberg. We also received Pastor Stanley Ayashim, recently ordained in the Lutheran Church of Christ in Nigeria, as a first call pastor through our partnership with the Lutheran World Federation. We welcome these seven new rostered ministers.

In addition to first call candidates, the synod staff works with call committees in more than two dozen congregations each year. In addition, the call manual was revised this past year and new protocols were developed to assist congregations to be open and ready to receive candidates who are persons of color or from the LGBTQIA community. As a synod, we know how important the gifts of all leaders are to the work of God's church.

During times of transition, the synod finds pastors and deacons to serve in interim roles. Those serving in in-

terim ministry meet monthly for prayer, mutual support and learning and are directed by Rolf Lowenberg-DeBoer. With Rachel Holsten, front office administrator and registrar, Rolf coordinated the Tool Kit for Congregational Leaders in February, which brought together 165 participants from 52 congregations. The two most attended workshops addressed issues of racism and implicit bias, issues which matter to all of us in this synod. In 2023, the synod also inaugurated the Deeper Dive series, a Zoom gathering for presidents and vice presidents. Twenty-four congregations participated in this inaugural series of monthly leadership training and support.

The synod also provides other initiatives to address congregational vitality. These workshops, which include Tools for the Church, Spiritual Gifts, Stewardship for All Seasons, Building a Culture of Generosity, and Liberating Structures, are led by Pastor Justin Grimm and members of the vitality team. In 2023, participants numbered more than 300.

Serving as mission developers and redevelopers during 2023 were Pastor Liz Eide, Lutheran Church of Peace; Pastor Jon Yurk, Christ the Servant; Pastor Thomas Tsen, Minnesota Faith Chinese; Pastor Dale Stiles, St. Paul in Wyoming; Pastor William Siong and Pastor Jua Jay Her at Eternal Flame; Pastor Gilo Agwa, Foundation of Life; Pastor Jodi Houge, Humble Walk; Deacon Kari Olson, Shobi's Table; and Pastor Ana Becerra, Cristo Rey. Pastors Ben and Kristen Eisele (Farmington Lutheran) completed an exploration for mission possibilities in Rosemount. When asked what is new (or renewed) in this synod, it's easy to see fresh ideas in all these settings.

During 2023 church groups were again able to travel to our partner churches in Guatemala and Tanzania. Five congregational groups were hosted by the Iglesia Luterana Agustina de Guatemala (ILAG). Two members of the Guatemala Committee, Janet Metcalfe and Jennifer Reinhardt, participated in an ELCA Global Mission international consultation in November. In 2023, 200 individuals from 16 congregations, nine affiliate organizations and two colleges traveled to the Iringa Diocese. As bishop, I was also thankful to be with our partners in Tanzania this past November.

The generosity of members of the synod supports our global companions with scholarships, emergency aid, congregation-to-congregation partnerships, and through prayer. Staff members Kirsten Levorson and Susan Seidel oversee the work of Bega Kwa Bega, which we undertake with our siblings in Tanzania. A grant from Lilly Endowment Inc. allowed additional opportunities for pastors to be well equipped for today's challenges. Synod pastors of color and the synod program staff participated in a facilitated retreat in Sedona, Ariz., in February. In addition, this past year 19 pastors, deacons, mentors, and a facilitator were a part of the Second Act cohort for rostered ministers in their fourth through tenth years of service. Our Lilly grant programs are directed by Leslie Ortiz.

Behind the scenes, Mary Smith oversaw the launch of our new website (spas-elca.org), along with 51 editions of the weekly *News and Events* newsletter, 40 companion synod newsletters, 300 social media posts, and other essential communication from the synod. (You can sign up to receive our newsletters at spas-elca.org/subscribe-to-synod-news.)

With all this creative work of the synod staff, you may wonder what the bishop does. As bishop, I work on governance with the Synod Council and Executive Committee, as well as meeting with the finance committee. I ordain new pastors and deacons and preach regularly (29 times in congregations, synod and churchwide events in 2023). I help plan the Bishop's Theological Conference and gatherings of the ministerium. I represent the synod on institutional boards and at ecumenical and inter-religious gatherings. I am a member of the Conference of Bishops and through 2023 served as a liaison bishop on the ELCA Church Council, as well as co-chairing the Lutheran-Catholic Dialogue. I work with congregations in times of conflict and oversee the discipline of rostered ministers, when needed. Best of all, I serve as a pastor for the pastors and deacons in this synod, meeting regularly with individual leaders.

If you have visited the synod office, you know that we are not a large-scale operation; but if you think about the range of ministry we do together in this synod, you know our collective impact is mighty. We can do so much because of the dedicated talent of the individuals on the synod staff. I am grateful for all that Rachel, Mary, David, Kirsten, Susan, Rolf, Justin, Krista and Leslie have accomplished this past year. I am also grateful for the work Ryan and Astine Bose did in the first half of the year as our short-term volunteers in Iringa. I hope you will join me in thanking the synod staff when you see or speak to them.
